



The following article paints a rich portrait of early pioneering around what would later become Boone Lake. The "Shoreliner" will carry it in two parts, with part two appearing in this summer's edition.



William Bean's Cabin

William Bean, (1721 1782) was the first registered permanent European-American (white) settler in what is now known as Tennessee. He was a gunsmith and hunting companion to Daniel Boone, the 18th century trailblazer for whom Boones Creek and Boone Lake are named. In 1769 William Bean built a cabin on a knoll beside Boones Creek where it joins the Watauga River near what is now Sonny's Marina. This site was a favorite camping site for Daniel Boone and William Bean on their hunting expeditions through the area. William's wife Lydia Bean gave birth to Russell Bean, the first white child born in Tennessee, at this site in 1769.



A marker that had been placed at the site of William Bean's cabin was moved in 1952 by TVA to higher ground as Boone Dam was near completion. The stone marker was moved 90 feet to the northwest because the original cabin site would soon be underwater.

As pioneering families from Virginia and North Carolina joined the Beans, a colony was formed that was outside of any governmental control so they founded the Watauga Association. The political history of Tennessee begins with a convention of the settlers on the Watauga River in 1772, who organized the Watauga Association and appointed a court consisting of five members which was entrusted with the entire administration of its laws. There were 13 members on the committee, and one of the names was William Bean. In 1775 a committee was formed that included William and they declared themselves the "Washington District." William served in the Revolutionary War from 1776 - 1780 as a Captain in the Watauga Riflemen. At the Battle of Kings Mountain, Captain Bean and his men scattered a band of Tories and hanged 9 of them. Captain William Bean was granted 3,000 acres of land by North Carolina for his service in the



Revolutionary War. Remembering the tall timber, fertile soil and abundant wildlife from his trips with Daniel Boone, he claimed the land near what is now known as Bean Station.

In July 1776 Lydia Bean (1726 - 1788) was captured along with 13 year old Samuel Moore, by hostile Cherokee Indians as she made her way from her home on Boones Creek to Sycamore Shoals, now in Elizabethton, Tn. Lydia was sentenced to execution and was being tied to a stake, but Nancy Ward, "beloved Woman" of the Cherokees, told the Indians that they could use Mrs. Bean's knowledge of making butter and cheese. Her life was spared and she was returned to her home. However, Samuel Moore wasn't so lucky. The Indians killed him at the stake. Lydia took dairy cows to Nancy Ward and taught the Indians how to prepare and use dairy foods which provided nour-



ishment when hunting was bad. Lydia also taught them how to set up a loom, spin thread or yarn and weave cloth for clothing. Indian women had always planted crops in the fields while the men hunted but with these changes the women took new jobs making clothing and dairy products. The men had to start planting the fields.

The Beans built a fort not far from their cabin to protect themselves from the unfriendly natives. The fort was built over a spring with water flowing from underneath the fort to prevent the Indians from poisoning their drinking water. The fort still stands today just off Flourville Road. The logs and rock from which the fort was originally constructed from have been covered with strip board siding. A house close to the fort was built around a 2 story log cabin that Russell Bean (first white child born in what is now Tennessee) built and it also still stands today.

LAKE OPERATIONS

We ended 2013 busier that we have ever been! This continued into 2014 with our three full time employees (Aaron Warren,

Keith Britt and David Whitaker). Our crew completed all cut, pile and burn activities at our current retention sites and headed into coves which had never been cleaned before. Our team cut, burned and picked up trash in these coves. We had calls from several BLA members pointing out other coves that needed cutting and burning. The lake is cleaner than it has ever been! Our team also cut and stacked wood at the various TVA campsites. I am sure our campers will appreciate these efforts!

In compliance with our Standard Operating Procedures, we purchased for our employees new metatarsal safety work boots, leather cutting chaps and face shields.

The week of February 24th, we partnered with the Johnson City Public Works Department (Dean Minier) and Washington County Sheriff's Detention Center (Sheriff Roger Phillips) to clean the entire shoreline and boardwalk of Johnson City's Winged Deer Park. We had huge stacks of logs piled on the boat ramps. Friday, the JC Public works truck picked up and hauled away all the logs. It looks GREAT!

After a few meetings and conversations with TVA and TWRA, our retention site at the 11E Boat Ramp has been approved. The Lake Operations Committee has met twice to discuss the logistics of the construction and location of the retention site due to new restrictions placed upon us by the TWRA. We will be ready to install the retention line in late March/early April.



BLA and Johnson City Public Works have agreed to empty the site every Friday. We will have our crew there to assist. This site was a real asset last year for BLA. We saved on labor, time and gas money not having to tow the logs for 10+ miles to our Marker 19 retention site. We would like to thank TVA and TWRA for approving this program.



WATER QUALITY COMMITTEE REPORT



- The committee will be testing for *E.coli* earlier in the season this year in case we encounter any problem areas from the extreme drawdown last winter. It will enable us to retest if necessary. Our thanks again to Johnson City and their lab technicians for running the tests on our water samples. If you would like to help gather samples this summer, give Ann Harrison a call at 423-323-3887. We can't do this without the help of our volunteers. It's not difficult and it gives you new insights into all the ways BLA keeps our lake clean!
- There may be some areas where algae are growing in large amounts producing low oxygen levels that are dangerous to fish populations. Please report any large fish kills to TDEC in Johnson City. They are also interested in knowing if there were large quantities of mussels killed by the low water and cold temperatures in your area of the lake this winter. Contact Tina Robinson with TDEC at tina.a.robinson@tn.gov if you are aware of any major kills this spring or summer. A reminder: As always, AVOID SWIMMING IN THE LAKE AFTER A HEAVY RAIN. About 650 streams run into Boone Lake carrying all types of runoff from streets, farmland and residential areas treated with insecticides, weed killers and fertilizers. Give these potentially toxic products a chance to be diluted, dissipated or settle to the bottom. Twenty four hours is recommended.
- ETSU will be showing a documentary on April 17, entitled **Water Blues: Green Solutions**. It will be at the D.P. Culp Center, 3rd floor Forum Room, 7 pm. This documentary tells the stories of communities in Philadelphia, Portland, San Antonio, and Bronx New York and highlights what they are doing to solve water problems in their area. The film presents a wide variety of issues associated with the global water crisis record-breaking droughts, devastating floods, and polluted water systems and describes how these issues have moved ordinary citizens, governments, and communities at large to look into sustainable solutions. Many innovative green solutions are introduced in this film that would be applicable to solving our water quality issues in Tennessee. This presentation is free and open to the public. No parking permit required.
